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The Alviso Marina County Park boat ramp (the southern-most green square in the map on the preceding page) in Santa Clara County opened on June 5, 2010 and exemplifies a well-designed mixed-used launch. The dock on the right is designed for non-motorized small boats and the ramp on the left is designed for motorized boats. This site is on the Bay Trail.



A similar mixed-use boat ramp and staging area is planned for Mt. Eden Creek at this site within the **Eden Landing Ecological Reserve** in Hayward, Alameda County, as part of the South Bay Salt Pond Restoration Project. Final designs, funded by the Conservancy, are complete. Construction is expected to begin in 2012. The site is owned and managed by the Department of Fish and Game and is on the Bay Trail.

The East Bay Regional Park District added a group **campsite** to **Point Pinole Regional Park** in Contra Costa County in late 2009 (shown here on opening day). Kayakers can pull out of the water on the nearby sandy shore, shown above left, and spend the night at this sheltered site. The Water Trail project will encourage and help support overnight accommodations at other sites around San Francisco Bay so that it will be possible to make multiple-day trips around the Bay.

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On-site boat storage could reduce the number of car trips associated with non-motorized small boat use and provide a storage solution for those without a car, without storage space at home, or for those using larger vessels. Brisbane Marina (San Mateo County), above left, provides simple but effective storage space for kayaks. Petaluma Marina provides storage for outrigger canoes (above right).



Launch sites around the Bay vary greatly in their design and accessibility to those with mobility disabilities. The “EZ Port” dock structure pictured on the left is private, but this design could be considered at various sites around the Bay. On the right is China Camp State Park, with beach access.



The Palo Alto Baylands gangway and dock provide excellent access for kayakers, canoeists, windsurfers, and the occasional rowboat when conditions are right for each type of water craft.
