

Photo 1. View looking west across parcel toward home site on right side of photo. The swath of green through the center of the photo is palustrine wetland surrounding Los Osos and Warden Creeks.



Photos 2 and 3. Aerial photo of property taken in 2012 and 1994. The 2012 photo shows the regrowth of riparian and wetland vegetation since conservation easement purchase in 1995. The access road is clearly visible. The 1994 photo shows the property in farming prior to easement purchase.




Photo 4. Topographic map from 1895 shows the confluence of Los Osos Creek and Warden Creeks in the proximity of the existing home site and access road.


Photo 8. View looking east down access road toward creek crossing. The site is dominated by Baywood fine sands which have a close relationship to several endemic species like Morro manzanita.



Photo 9. View looking northeast across upland home site with unoccupied house and barn. This area would be restored to coastal scrub dune habitat.




Photo 10. Steelhead trout captured in Los Osos Creek.




