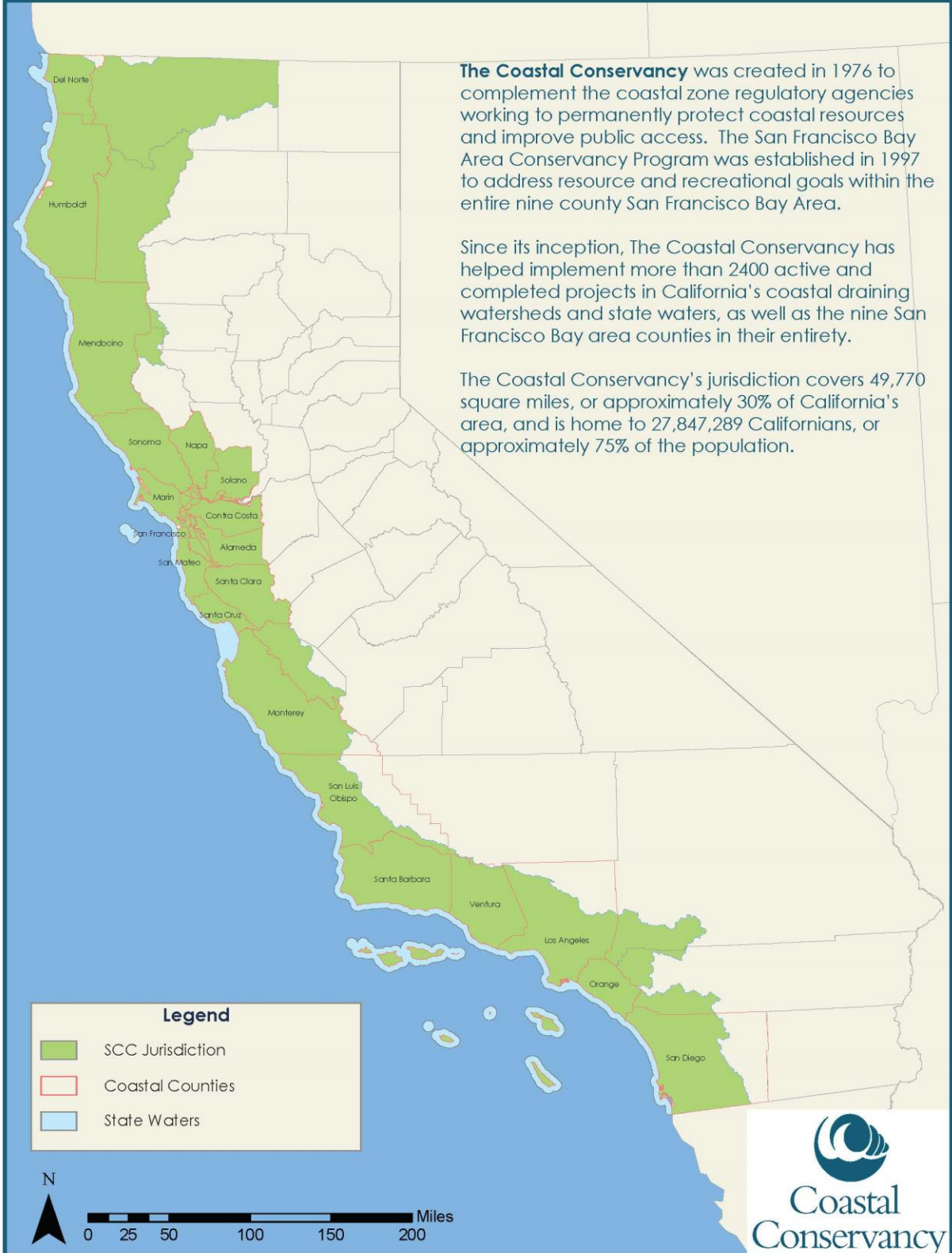


# Exhibit 1: Project Location Map

## State Coastal Conservancy Jurisdiction



The Coastal Conservancy was created in 1976 to complement the coastal zone regulatory agencies working to permanently protect coastal resources and improve public access. The San Francisco Bay Area Conservancy Program was established in 1997 to address resource and recreational goals within the entire nine county San Francisco Bay Area.

Since its inception, The Coastal Conservancy has helped implement more than 2400 active and completed projects in California's coastal draining watersheds and state waters, as well as the nine San Francisco Bay area counties in their entirety.

The Coastal Conservancy's jurisdiction covers 49,770 square miles, or approximately 30% of California's area, and is home to 27,847,289 Californians, or approximately 75% of the population.

Population and area for 9 Bay Area Counties and State of California is from the 2010 Census (American Factfinder).  
Population for the coastal draining watersheds was determined by counting the population within Census Blocks (2010 Census) that have a portion of their area within the watersheds. There is some error within this method, but the "Block" is the smallest unit of area that the U.S. Census provides population for and therefore the most accurate method available to the public. Area for the watersheds was calculated by using ArcGIS.
